

## Latinos in Heritage Conservation Lesson Plan

**Lesson Plan Title:** Resurrecting History: Unveiling the Mexican Heritage at Texas' Rediscovered Cemetery

Subject: Mexican American History, historic preservation

Grade level: 5<sup>th</sup>

**Lesson duration:** 60 minutes

## Lesson objectives:

- 1. Students will remember and understand important facts about Mexican American heritage and historic preservation discussed in previous lessons (Celebrating Mexican American Heritage: Exploring Culture, Contributions, and Identity and Preserving Our Past: Understanding the Significance of Historic Preservation).
- 2. Students will apply this knowledge to the Cedar Creek Cemetery site and analyze the importance of its preservation.
- 3. Students will create their own Día de los Muertos ofrenda, allowing them to participate in a Mexican American tradition.

Procedure:	1. Introduction (5 minutes): Students will
	read along with the teacher as they read
	aloud the "A Call to Action" section in the
	Cedar Creek Tool kit.

	2. Recall and Connect (15 minutes): Guided Discussion linking back to
	importance of historic preservation:
	- Think back to our lesson on historic
	preservation. Why is historic preservation
	important?
	- How can we relate historic preservation
	to the Cedar Creek cemetery?
	- What happens when no one cares about
	sites like these?
	- Why is it important to save a site like a
	cemetery?
	- The people in this cemetery are of
	Mexican descent. Think back to our
	discussion on Mexican heritage. Are there
	any customs or celebrations that may relate to the Cedar Creek cemetery?
	i ciate to the Cettar Creek temetery;
	- Show students BrainPop! video on Día de
	los Muertos. (7 minutes)
	- Continue discussion to set up activity (5-8
	minutes)
	- Discuss how celebrations of those who
	have passed can be a joyous occasion.
	- What are the elements to this
	celebration?



	- Teacher will guide students into
	discussing an ofrenda.
	- What is the importance of an ofrenda
	and Dia de los Muertos to the Cedar Creek
	cemetery?

	3. Class Activity (30 minutes):
	- Explain to students that they will be
	building an ofrenda for anyone they'd like
	to honor on their desk (this can be a family
	member, friend, pet, famous person, etc.).
	- Have students inform you of who they
	are choosing. If possible, print their
	pictures out for the students. Students may
	also draw pictures if they prefer.
	- Pass out supplies so that students can
	make papel picados.
	- Walk students through the process:
	- layer tissue paper together and fold
	in half several times as if you were making
	a paper snowflake.
	- students will cut shapes along the
	sides, but not where the folds are.
	- students will then unfold the tissue
	paper and connect it to the yarn.
	- Encourage students to bring in items over
	the course of the week to add to the
	ofrendas.
	- On the last day of the week, have each
	student share their ofrenda and explain a
	little about the person they chose to honor.
